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
INTRODUCTION

During 2024, Shakespeare North Playhouse delved into the heritage of language through workshops with children, young people, and community groups. These workshops explored the unique colloquialisms of the region and how they are influenced by various factors, including:

- Migration
- Industry
- Social Structure
- Culture
- Local Heritage

Inspired by Shakespeare's linguistic legacy and the First Folio, the project uncovered some fascinating local language, celebrating the heritage of Knowsley and the wider Liverpool City Region.

This resource includes activities to engage students in language heritage, empowering them to use their voices proudly and celebrate the uniqueness of their town and region.

PROJECT OVERVIEW & OUTCOMES

Our Town's Sound, a heritage project led by Shakespeare North Playhouse and funded with £228,850 from The National Lottery Heritage Fund, successfully deepened community engagement while celebrating Knowsley's linguistic heritage. Inspired by Shakespeare's linguistic legacy and the First Folio, the project explored how language evolves, shaped by factors such as migration, popular culture, social structures, and local heritage; highlighting the diverse voices and stories that make up the fabric of the local area.

Outcomes

- Participants expressed a strong sense of pride and ownership in co-creating the soundscapes, performances and films, valuing how their voices and experiences were authentically represented.
- The project successfully encouraged intergenerational collaboration, creating a platform to connect diverse community members through shared stories.
- Celebrating Heritage: The integration of local dialects, accents, and storytelling traditions was deeply appreciated by participants, reinforcing a sense of cultural identity and pride in the area's heritage by reflecting their connection to place and the importance of preserving local language and oral histories.

- Can your students draw this missing borough on the map and label it?





Activity - Key Stages 2 & 3

Curriculum links to Local History and Geography.

Knowsley is ideally placed to explore the changes in language between towns, being sandwiched between St. Helens, Liverpool, Sefton and Halton. Each borough has its own distinctive heritage, which has influenced language development over time.

- Discuss the different areas of the Liverpool City Region and what they are famous for.
- 2. There are some suggestions in the table below, but your students may have some other ideas.



SLANG PATTERNS

Activity - Key Stages 2 & 3

Curriculum links to English, Art and Music

A group of local young people worked with artist David Bixter to create a film celebrating their local dialect. Watch the film <u>HERE</u>.



David is a multidisciplinary artist, designer, musician and film-maker based in Liverpool. His work combines different art forms, exploring connections between drawing and music-making. He uses music technology to create interactive soundscapes and immersive multisensory experiences.



Activity

Can your students think of any slang words that they use? Write these on the board.

Examples:

- What do they call (a specific type of) food?
- What do they call their friends?
- What do they call their clothes?



USING THE APP

Use our online application to explore soundscapes and music compositions with your students. You can access the app HERE.

- 1. Use the online app to create a short pattern of words by touching or clicking on the letters (3 or 4). Practice this starting pattern as a class either on individual iPads or spoken.
- 2. Students take turns to repeat the pattern on their iPad or on the smart board, each adding another word to the end of the pattern.
- 3. See how many extra words can be added before it becomes too long to remember!



MUSICAL EXTENSION



To increase the challenge, words can be added in a rhythmic pattern - you do not need to play the whole word, e.g.:

Sca-Scatty

Muppet-Muppet

Ma - Ma - Mate

You can use the rhythm flashcards <u>HERE</u> to provide rhythms that students have to recreate using the words. Or students can write their own rhythm flashcards and challenge each other to recreate the patterns.



REPLACED WORD POEM

- 1. Each student writes a rhyming couplet that uses slang words.
- 2. Perform the rhyming couplets using the resource to speak the slang words.
- 3. Create a whole-class poem by combining the couplets (the class could be given a theme at the start of the session).

 Perform the poem with everyone in the class using the resource to play the slang words.



COMPOUND WORDS - Key stage 2 and 3

Artist Emmer Winder worked with schools and groups to explore Shakespeare's language, compound words and printing.

Emmer is a conceptual artist, print maker and creative facilitator from St Helens. She is driven to comment on socio-political issues and historical events in an attempt to keep them in the public consciousness. Incorporating any methods and materials that feel relevant, work is created to question the morals, ethics and confirmation bias of western culture through one common thread: words, language and signs. The power of the written word is used as an invitation to engage, empathise and evoke reaction from the viewer.
